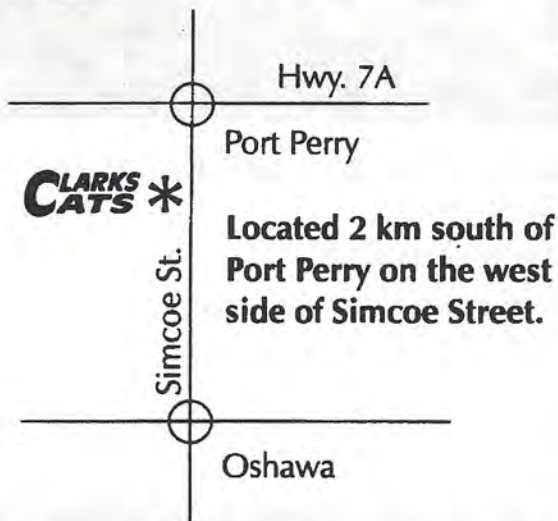

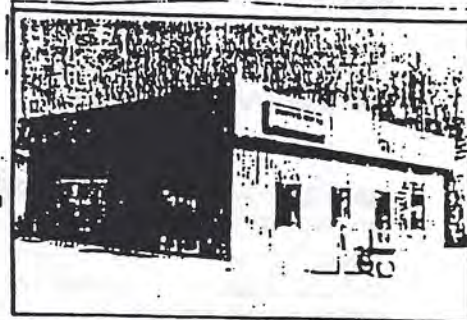

Haliburton Lake loses another original owner

Art Dean of lot 12, plan 330 Wilson Heights in South Bay, husband of Rita for 41 years, passed away on October 31st, 1994. Art was one of the originals who came up to the lake in 1953 to look at a model cottage built near the public beach and went home the owner of a cottage that had not even been built yet. Rita and family will still retain the cottage and hopefully can continue to enjoy what has been part of their lives for 42 years.

History in the making is the best way to describe the passing of Larry Barjarow of Haliburton Lake. Larry and his wife Alma first came to the lake in 1950 where they undertook to clear the land and build KIA-ORA Cottage Resort, which they continued to operate until 1968 when they sold and took up residence further north on the Lake. For those, like me who did not know what KIA-ORA meant, I can now tell you. Larry met and befriended a gentleman from New Zealand while they were both prisoners of war overseas and after the war continued to correspond in writing.

As each letter was signed off it was accompanied by KIA - ORA which means "Greetings / Good Health". Larry's passing on December 31st 1994, was quiet and peaceful, something like what the lake was when he first came here.

Haliburton Lake loses another Founding Member of HLCA

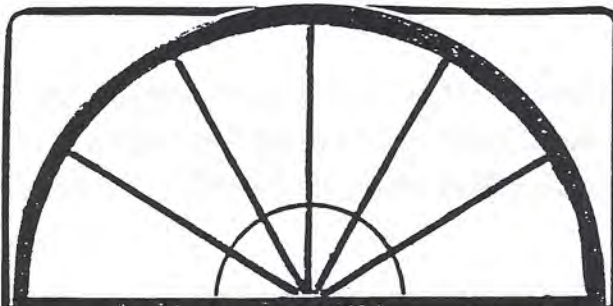
Hugh Newton along with Howard Didnan, John Potts and Peter Hucal founded what was first the South Bay Cottager's Association, in 1953. In 1954 the name changed to it's present name, The Haliburton Lake Cottager's Association Inc. by these same gentlemen.

Hugh like many purchased a cottage and lot at the Sportsman Show in Toronto, site unseen. Hugh along with wife Flo and son Graham took possession of their new cottage on July 1st, 1953. As a founding executive member of the association, followed by President for a couple of years and Treasurer and Director at Large, this left little time for the family or cottage. Both Flo and Hugh worked for Eatons (Hugh for 35 years), when even the executive had to work on Saturdays, so after work they would head north, taking Monday in leu.

In 1991, Hugh and Flo passed the cottage on to their son Graham and his wife Lynda and their children Carrie and Robin, for them to enjoy, as they had. Hugh passed away peacefully in January 1995.

Frank Palmer and wife Dorothy along with children Carol and Wally, first came to Haliburton Lake in the summer of 1966 as renters. They continued to rent until 1969, when they purchased Lot 34, Plan 395 and built what would become their permanent residence.

Frank and Dorothy made the lake their home for 18 years, spending the cold winter months in Texas. Frank passed away September 30th, 1994 in his 81st year, after spending his last full summer by the shores of what had become a favorite part of his life.

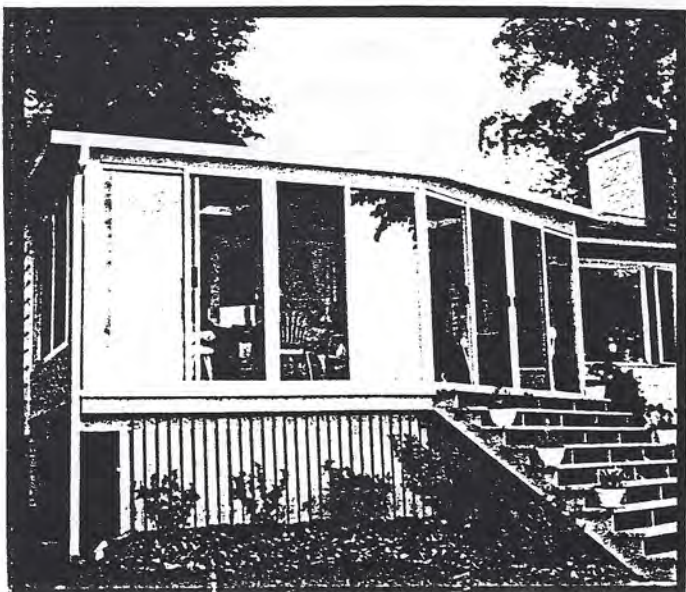
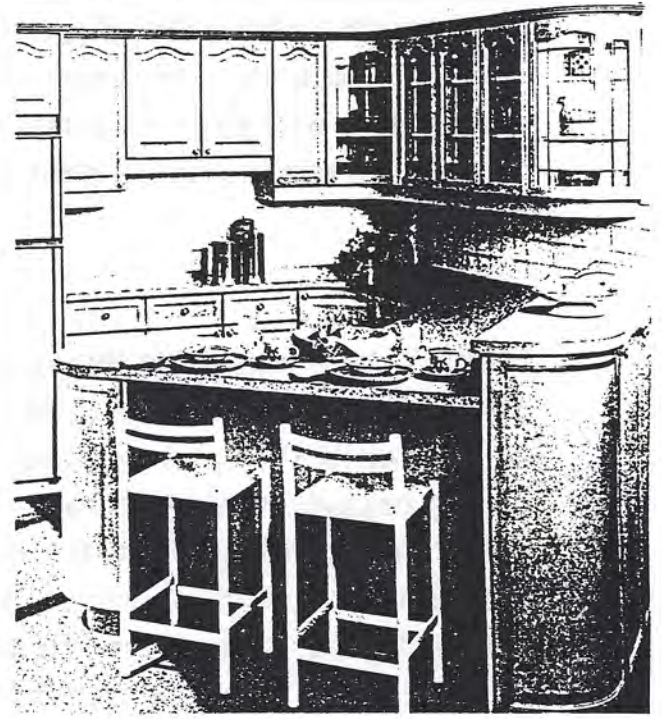

NAVIGATION:

1994 saw the Lake Navigation System start a necessary overhaul. New markers were made and RETROREFLECTIVE tape was affixed to most of the existing markers for night boating. When installed, this tape would actually register the red / green bow lights well in advance of reaching the buoys but the brighter white stern light made the tape stand out the best. The markers have a tendency to lay over as the water levels recede. We have found a way to rectify this problem and have started to make the necessary repairs. As well as the present markers, watch this year for a new, more stable, higher marker. We will be testing these new markers in the 2 highest risk / traffic areas - South Bay Channel and the Narrows at the end of the Big Island. If this new system proves to work as expected, we will be standardizing all the lake markers in this way.

If you know of a danger area that the HLCA is not marking or if a marker should break loose - Please call Eric Kuiper at 754-2094 or leave word at the Marina with Brian or Carol.

RULES OF THE LAKE

The following is a list of items to keep in mind when you are enjoying your cottage life. For those of you who rent your cottage this should be placed in a prominent position, as many renters are unfamiliar with some of unique conditions surrounding country property.

(1) WATER QUALITY

- (a) Never attempt to kill weeds in lake with any weed killing agent or chemical. This is a crime under the Fisheries Act, and carries a stiff fine.
- (b) Don't use soaps, shampoo or detergents in lake
- (c) Don't use fertilizers on lawns or gardens near the lake
- (e) Don't pour fuels near water or on the dock.
- (f) Don't idle boat motors when not necessary.

(2) BOATING SAFETY

- (a) Keep a bailer, oars, and lifejacket for each passenger in the boat at all times, and at night carry a flashlight (or use your runninglights).
- (b) Observe the 5MPH SPEED LIMIT under the bridges and through the channels.
- (c) When water skiing wear a life jacket, have a spotter in the boat, keep clear of swimmers, and stop your motor when taking skiers aboard.
- (d) Swimmers in open water must be accompanied by a boat.
- (e) Replace worn or leaky fuel lines.
- (f) It is illegal to consume any alcoholic beverages in a boat. Driving a motor boat while impaired is a criminal offence.

(3) COTTAGE SAFETY

- (A) Remove your valuables, guns and liquor from the cottage when closing for the season
- (b) Identify your valuables with an engraver (available from OPP in Minden) by placing a distinguishing mark in an inconspicuous place.
- (c) Keep a supply of candles and flashlights on hand in case of a blackout.
- (d) Keep a first aid kit on hand. Replace consumed items and be sure to check the expiry date.
- (e) In the winter don't park on ploughed roads.

(4) ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

- (a) When using the dumps make sure all the garbage goes entirely over the hill. Messy dumps have been closed by the Municipality in the past.
- (b) Put ONLY household garbage in the dumps. NO BRUSH, BOATS, FURNITURE, ETC. ONLY IN DESIGNATED AREAS. If you are doing renovations, use a dumpster and tell your contractor not to put wood, shingles etc. into the dump.
- (c) Please keep our public beaches, lake, and roadsides clean. Put garbage in the cans provided.
- (d) Don't peel bark off, or otherwise mutilate living trees.
- (e) Remember to recycle bottles, cans and newspapers. Recycling bins available beside Rob Pooles at Fort Irwin Centre.

(5) SEPTIC TANKS

- (a) Septic tanks can handle all household wastes, including those from toilet, sink, showers, baths, washing machine and garbage-grinder. The amount of grease, household cleaners and disinfectants ordinarily encountered the household kitchen will not have any detrimental effect.
- (b) DON'T allow any paper towels, disposable diapers, sanitary napkins, tampons, cigarette and cigar butts, newspapers, wrapping papers, or rags to enter into tank. They are difficult to decompose and can clog the system.
- (c) Don't add any chemicals to the tank. No products are required to clean the tank or accelerate or improve it's action. All necessary bacteria are present in the tank and once the anaerobic process beings, nothing special needs to be added.
- (d) DON'T OVERLOAD YOUR TANK. If you are having a party, be sure you know the capacity of your tank.
- (e) Don't let any water from roof drains, foundation drains or any other source of runoff, enter your septic tank.
- (f) Inspect your tank annually to see if cleaning is required. If so, call a reputable pump-out service. Regular cleaning will save you money in the long run.

If everyone takes heed of the above rules our properties will keep there high value both in dollars and in beauty for many generations to come.

SAFE AND SOBER OPERATOR

Many of us enjoy the use of recreational vehicles - boats, snowmobiles, dirt bikes, all-terrain vehicles, personal watercraft, etc.. However, it is also important to understand that there are significant risks involved with the unsafe use of them. Each year, numerous serious injuries and fatalities occur as a result of the consumption of alcohol and/or other drugs while attempting to drive these various forms of recreational transport.

Safe and Sober Operator: A Community Action Manual to Promote the Safe Operation of Recreational Vehicles and Boats and its companion **Resources Directory** have been specifically designed to assist community groups and other interested parties take action on drinking and driving countermeasures by providing all the tools needed to develop and implement community education/awareness campaigns that work.

TIME HAS COME TO GIVE YOUR INSURANCE A SECOND LOOK!:

Although we got away pretty lucky this year as compared to the last few years, there were still a few break and enters this past winter. Nothing can be worse than to pull in the driveway and find you have been robbed, unless you were the victim of a B and E and your home or cottage was vandalized as well. This was the case with 2 cottager's this winter. Have your insurance agent/broker go over your policy and explain what coverage you actually have and if there are any stipulations. A number of cottager's I have spoken with recently found out that their insurance is void if they don't have proof that it is being checked every 48 to 72 hours. Others have found out too late that the garage insurance was for the building only (not updated from when first built) and did not cover the contents.

Your insurance agent/broker is there to work for you, so give them a call. It is better to be safe now, than sorry later.

(P.S. - A local electronics company just installed a security system in a cottage on the lake for approximately \$400.00, that when triggered will phone 2 numbers of your choice as well as sound an alarm and set an interior light flashing on and off and allows the receiver of the phone call to hear what is taking place inside the house. If anyone is interested in more information on this system, I will be glad to put you in touch with the installer.)

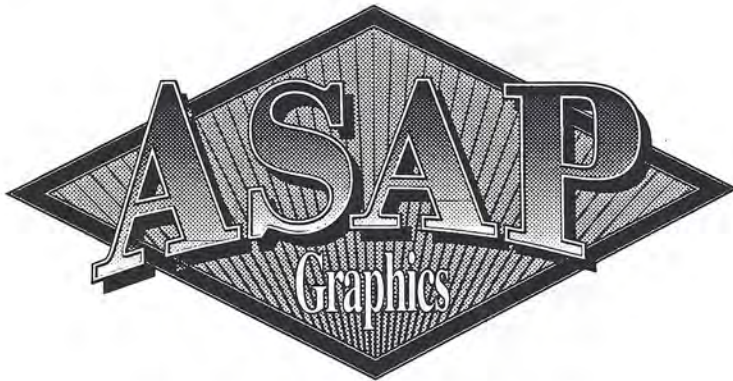
