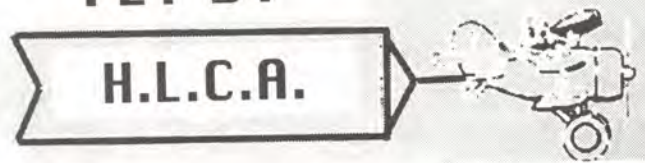

## The H.L.C.A. SKI COURSE

Since 1988 the Association has maintained a water ski slalom course in the bay in the south east corner of the main lake, sometimes referred to as "Echo Bay". The Association has a permit from the Ministry of Natural Resources to use Echo Bay for this course, the installation is approved by the Canadian Coast Guard and the adjacent property owner does not object. The course is available for the use by all and is located well away from any cottages that may not appreciate the wakes from the ski boats and in a low traffic area of the lake. The course will be put in this summer again and we encourage you to use it. To ensure the safe and enjoyable skiing for all, we ask that you respect the following rules:

1. Only one boat on the course at a time! Wait your turn safely out of the way and try not to make any waves for the person skiing.
2. Be courteous and relinquish the course as soon as your skier has had enough. Do not "hog" it by changing skiers while stopped in the way of others.
3. Re-tie any balls that you accidentally cut loose but if you cannot please don't take the ball away intending to turn it in. Put it in the inner tube anchored in the bay for that purpose or on the shore where those who maintain the course can find it.
4. Do NOT use the course if any of the six outside, "turning" balls are missing. When this happens the plastic pipes and cables which hold the course in place to the surface and could cause damage or injury.
5. Watch when you drag you ski rope past any of the balls as this cuts the strings which hold them in place.

For those of you who have not used the course yet, give it a try! It is a real challenge and a healthy, skill building outlet for youthful energy. Some tips:

1. Use a single slalom ski.
2. Drive more slowly than you might with two skis until the skier can get through the "gate" balls and around the outside of all six "turning" balls.
3. The skier will fall hard so make sure their PFD fits very snugly and don't use those old fashioned ski belts.
4. Ski when the water is calmer. Early evening is often best,
5. Use a ski rope that has the shortening loops on it. Start at the first loop, "15 off", then shorten it to make it more challenging.
6. Enjoy yourself!

## HAVE YOU GOT YOUR BOATING LICENSE ?

**As of September 15, 1999 - all children 16 years and under need to have a valid boating license in order to drive a motor powered boat in Canada. People under 16 are not allowed to operate a personal water craft at all. ( They may only be passengers. )**

This past summer we offered a comprehensive boating course designed for people 12 years of age and over. We had a couple of 10 and 11 years olds too. It was sanctioned by the Royal Lifesaving Society and the Canadian Coast Guard. Each course ran for 2 hours per day, for 4 days and the test was on the 5th day.

Paul Sutton, our instructor, spent many long hours putting together lessons that were both fun and easy to follow. In fact, he did such a great job teaching the material, that there was a 100% success rate on the tests.

There were several opportunities for people 17 and over to come and write the test. These people read the Boating '99 book from the Coast Guard and then wrote the test at the Hall. Once again, we had a 100% success rate. We have copies of the book at the Marina.

The summer of 2000 will see the Boating courses and tests being offered once again. However, we are now able to give the course and tests to children, 8 years of age and up ( since the Coast Guard has sent us the tests for younger children ).

Anyone 8 years old and up can take advantage of these courses.

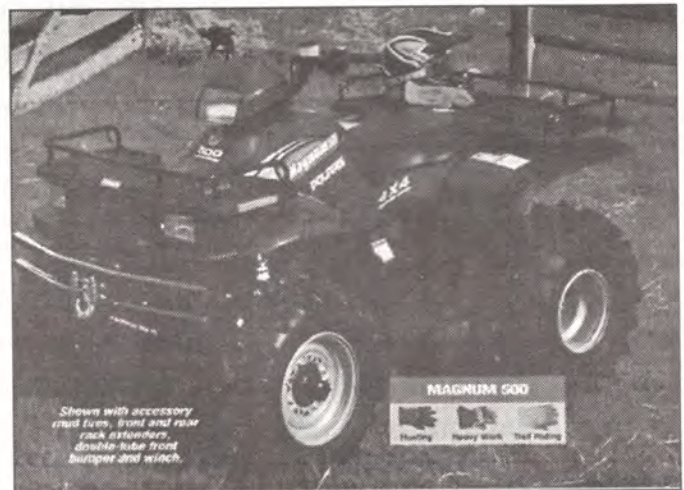

An end of an era has come...

The following is an excerpt written by one of 4 men who play a big part in Haliburton Lake history, and even more in my life growing up here. It is with sorrow and honor that the time has come to run this article as it signifies an end to an era but that life must go on ... hopefully with memories as fond as I have .

### **THE SYRUP MAKERS OF THE 1970'S**

Today at Haliburton Lake we have one evaporator operation. This is the former H.R. Cummings, Wm. Jacyna, Doc. Hewitt limited operation. The 'limited' stands for the limit of energy expended, not the traditional term of Capitalization. It is a three level operation. The top is the area of the Jacyna activity and not necessarily the Presidential Seat. The middle, the Doc Hewitt section. This is NOT, as some comment has been made, a section of canals, but rather a system of paths from tree to tree and, what one could take for the Corporation flag floating, is actually Doc's hat bobbing above the snow. The bottom or base area is the H.R Cummings section. It really does not have uphill paths from tree to tree, but if one were to observe the collector, they might think so.

The middle and base areas' are collected by pails which are taken directly to the evaporator house. Collection in the top level is conducted by snowmobile towing a barrel, several other barrels strategically positioned throughout the area all connected by pipeline that travels directly to the evaporator house storage tanks.

The evaporator uses a large quantity of wood each spring. The cutting of which makes one realize the difficulties of our early settlers. With handy wood having 'been exhausted', this year saw the start of 'Cummings Road', a 4 wheel drive adventure that included the building of a bridge (from fresh twister damaged poplar at the exact location of the crossing), that would have won a Pulitzer Prize if entered. The road was surveyed following the close of the 1977 syrup season, while the ground was still snow covered, the general location is such that it proceeds into an immature forest stand. One can only expect the road building project to reach completion by the time the trees are mature enough to be cut. The new evaporator and building are completed. Progress has taken over and this operation is being modernized. Pails are giving way to gravity collection through pipeline. Electric pumps are being used. The firm may have a president who wears a tie, although this is yet to be decided. 1979 saw the 'Threesome Company' change due to Wm. Jacyna moving onto bigger and better things and Doc Hewitt reducing his part of the operation to a separate activity set up behind his house. Whether Doc will use the traditional over the kettle piece of long clear pork to prevent boiling over, is expected to be a decision made in March. The side hill operation will be of renewed interest with the gravity hose collection system, once under full operation. Some of the romance (work) will be lost to new modern methods, acceptable only if the same required result is achieved. Time will tell.

(Glen gave me this writing some time ago and while going through some files of Haliburton Lake for the Museum, I came across it and felt time had come to share it with all who knew these gentlemen).

Some may read this and think that Glen did not like any of the men mentioned in the previous article. Not so. Some may think it is a case of sour grapes. Again, not so. Glen was a reader and a watcher, and a wealth of knowledge on any topic you might question him on. Glen was also a reader of people and retained so much information on so many topics, maple syrup being one of them. But you can't always believe what you read, right? I remember the time Glen came to the sugar bush and was explaining to the operators what to look for in a sugar maple tree. The tree he chose, situated right beside the original sugar shack, was a fine specimen of a sugar maple, with all the desired qualities of a tree that should produce vast quantities of sap. It had a large round crown, sat on the edge of a clearing that would receive sun from the morning, through to early afternoon, and its' proximity made for the least effort when collecting! To this day I still tap "Glens' Tree", and it still remains one of the worst producers in the entire bush. Go figure. When I first visited to the operation, it was March 1974, and the 'Threesome Company' were just starting their second season, expanding the number of taps greatly, and the evaporator consisted of a 20 foot long horse trough, mounted on two courses on cement blocks and a steel road culvert for a chimney. The wood used for firing was of equal length, dead stand, taken from the sugar bush surrounding the evaporator, in an effort to clean up the bush. It also included a lot of Dutch Elm that was standing dead due to disease. I can still remember when Billy could not get the fire to go fast enough, he would induce the effort with a little stimulant, stove oil, and from a distance it would appear there was a coal fired steam locomotive getting ready to leave the station.

I was lucky enough to be present for the building of the "prize winning bridge", and was privy to its need. With the way clear on the off side of the creek, an attempt was made to cross with the 1951 Willies Overland Pick up. Much to Billy's dismay (or so he thought), Harley was being *'too cautious'*, and suggested that maybe he could 'give it a try'. I have never seen so much black, smelly mud fly through the air in my life. Lets just say it was a good thing that Billy, whom nothing phased on, had his army jeep on site, and that it was equipped with a winch, as he had Harley's jeep buried and that was the only way it was coming out.

The bobbing of Doc's hat brought to mind his theory of drinking fresh sap each day, a gallon of it, fresh from the tree as the Indians did for the vitamin source. Or the time when I asked Billy why he had tapped a bass wood tree (he had an answer). Or the debate between Harley and Billy over the frozen sap after a cold night, 'Does it contain sap or is it just water?' (this one still goes undecided).

SO many memories and so many good times. This special periodical is brought to you to signify the end of an era, with the passing of the last of these 4 gentlemen, Harley Cummings, on May 10th, 1999. They all meant a lot to me, but it was Harley with whom I spent most of youth, and from who I learned so much about the bush and love for Haliburton Lake.

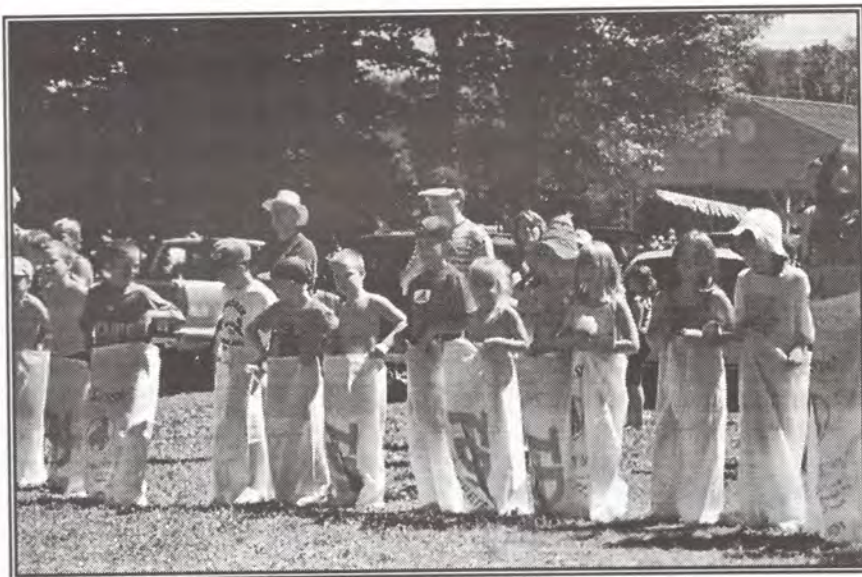

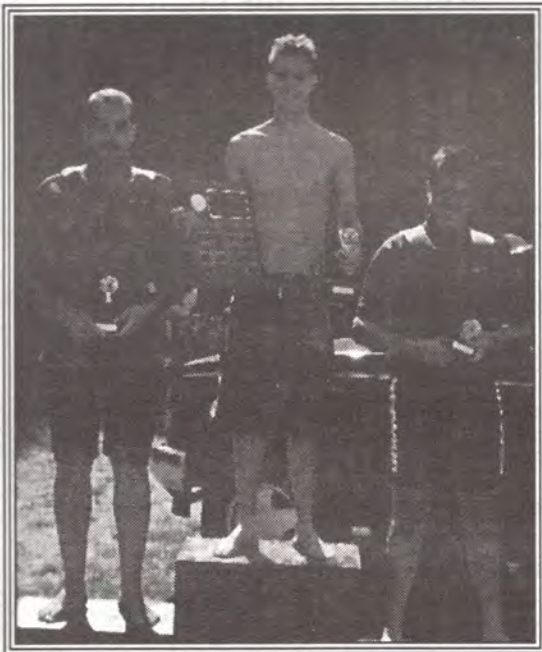

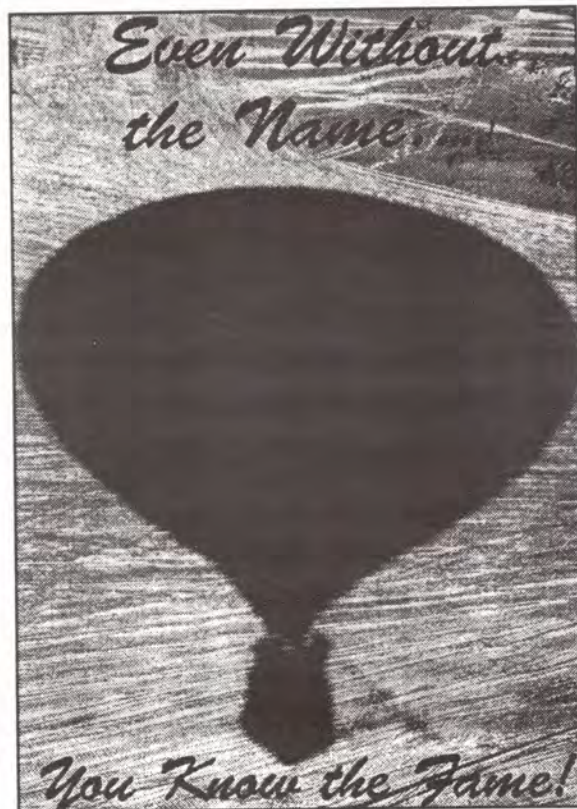

**MUNICIPALITY OF DYSART et al**  
**BURNING REGULATIONS APRIL 1 - OCTOBER 31, 2000**

1. Fires must be attended at all times.
2. Person in charge must be competent.
3. Must have adequate equipment to extinguish fire.
4. No burning between two (2) hours after sunrise to two (2) hours before sunset.
5. Person is responsible for any damages.
6. Fire must be away from combustibles material by at least three (3) meters.
7. Pile is not to exceed 2 meters high.

**ACCEPTED MATERIALS AT LANDFILL SITES**

**Recycling** Listed below are what materials can be recycled at all Landfill Sites within the Municipality of Dysart et al ( excluding the Harcourt Landfill Site ).

**Containers** This includes plastic containers, plastic bottles, styrofoam containers, clear glass bottles (rinsed), coloured glass bottles (rinsed), plastic bags, and metals (pop cans, aluminum foil, tin cans).  
**DO NOT** include aerosol cans, butter or candy wrap, 'take-out' lids, metallic potato chips or snack food bags, blister foil for tablets/pills, paint cans, metal pots & pans, sheet metal, vinyl siding, ceramics, dishes, window glass, pyrex, or drinking glasses.

**Fibres** This includes brown paper bags, waxed cartons, household paper, magazines, newspapers, boxboard (i.e. cereal boxes), fibre egg cartons, and cardboard.  
**DO NOT** include hard cover books or waxed boxes.

**Tipping Fees** There will be a tipping fee of \$2.00 per bag of garbage to ANYONE coming to the Landfill sites without a valid card. Payment will be made to the attendant.

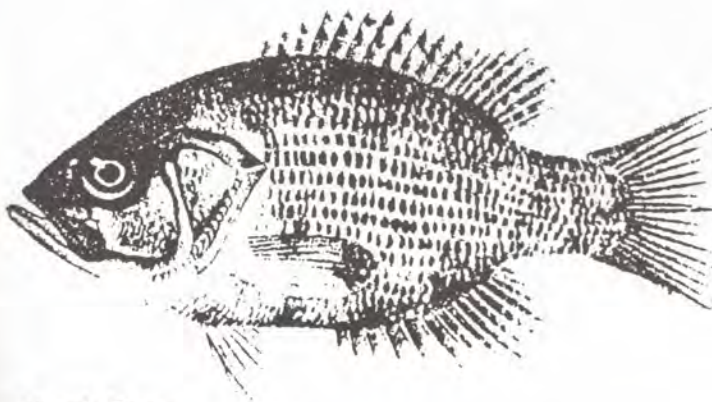

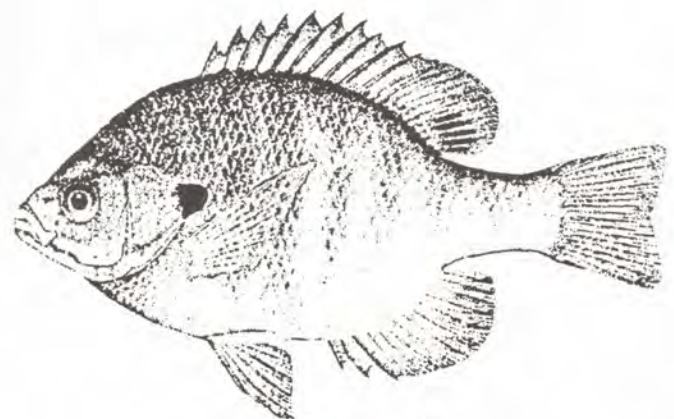

## 13 TH ANNUAL FORT IRWIN POKER & RADAR RUN

With world weather seemingly in a constant state of upheaval, winter seasons shrinking and more and more groups vying for this short, but exciting, season, planning and running an event such as this is very difficult.
