Special Thanks to Patty and Gary Shearer, Sue and Al Knight, Sandy and Bill Barry and Christine and Merle Collins.



To Al and Sue Knight for picking up the fireworks and transporting them up here. A special Thanks to those who made a financial contribution to help defray the purchase cost.



HALIBURION LAKE SUPPORTS THE HALIBURTON HOSPITAL

As times keep getting tougher for everyone, our emergency services should still remain a top priority, no matter what the cost.

Some will remember a few years ago there was a fund raising drive initiated in Haliburton to raise funds for the hospital expansion. At this time, the H.L.C.A. was approached for a contribution, which of course we complied with a donation of \$500.00. In 1995, the hospital (which still doesn't have it's addition, but the Province promises it soon) was trying to raise monies for a new and badly needed x-ray machine. Well as most of you know the H.L.C.A. has sold Nevada tickets for the past 2 years as another fund raiser to support our endeavors on the lake. We have paid out \$4000.00 in the past two years, and realized a profit of \$1000.00. Realizing that the hospital is an important part of everyone's lives at the cottage, the H.L.C.A. made a \$200.00 donation to the Haliburton Hospital x-ray fund from the Nevada ticket profits. The Haliburton Hospital now has a state of the art x-ray facility.

In 1996, the hospital is fundraising to purchase two new heart monitors, so the H.L.C.A. has dedicated another \$200.00 from Nevada tickets sales, plus the proceeds from the Bake sale, to go to the Haliburton Hospital. So lets support the Bake sale and buy more Nevada tickets and in turn support your local hospital!

HALL MAINTENANCE

As many noticed and commented on, the H.L.C.A. Church / Hall was beginning to fall into a state of disrepair over the past few years. The hall maintenance reports from 1994 and 1995 newsletters have explained what needed to be replaced or repaired; outfitting the kitchen, finishing the ceiling, replacing the front deck, to major overhaul of the floor and its supporting beams and joists and in doing so bringing the floor and end wall up approx. 6 inches. This now allows us to permanently mount the kitchen cupboards and counter as the floor is now reasonably level.

Well 1995 saw the completion of the ceiling (Thanks Mike!) and the complete painting of the outside of the building, which in some places took three coats, Thanks to Debbie Lambe! More Thanks to Mike Fimio for keeping the Hall driveway plowed all winter.

1996 will see exhaust fans installed in the ceiling, additional lighting to make it easier to see while playing Bingo and if there is enough money left in the budget, the interior walls might get painted. There has also been some discussion of an equipment room being added to the rear of the Hall for storage. For the past 3 years, we have kicked around how to replace the windows. There are 11 windows and 1 door that have to be replaced and cost estimates are all around the \$200.00 each mark for windows which is too great an expense for the Association to handle.

One suggestion was made to make windows available for cottagers to purchase in memory of a loved one or family member. Another idea was for areas or plans of the lake to all chip in on a window which would be installed in honour of that said group. 

Looking back on that summer, Wendy came to realize it had been a turning point. It was the summer she stopped feeling like a city kid at the cottage and started feeling like a cottage kid. Period. The weather helped. Hot, sunny days slipped into warm fragrant nights. She would lie, tanned and tired under a light blanket and look out her window at the moon filtered through her favourite pine tree. On the breeze coming in off the bush, she would catch a trace of raspberries, moss and something else she could not name. Her dad used to say it was all the wild animals living in the forest. The wild smell. It made her feel a little scared, lying there in her bed, but only a little.

Wendy's days were filled with cottage kid - type things. She and her sisters and cousins would jump off the dock until their arms and legs ached from pulling themselves up the ladder. Then, like panting seals, they would lie flat out in the scorching sun until they could not take the heat any more and had to jump back into the water.

She loved the meals at the cottage that summer. Because it was so hot, Wendy was either just coming out of the water or just going into it, so when she stopped for lunch, she was usually wearing a damp bathing suit. It felt wonderfully naughty to sit on the vinyl kitchen seats wolfing down a couple of sandwiches and watermelon pieces before her mother got around to asking her if her bathing suit was wet. By then it was too late. The meal was over and she was back outside again, her summer - toughened feet skipping over the deck.

That was also the summer of the absolutely best marshmallow roast she could ever remember. She and the kids had been encouraged to pile driftwood on the beach for weeks and the adults had contributed larger pieces they had found lying around as well. The sun dried these out nicely and the pile became quite high. After supper and going to the store, where their mom bought cold pop and a fresh bag of marshmallows, they all trooped over to the lakeshore.

The grownups carried folding chairs and flashlights for the walk back. Wendy and the other kids carried their towels rolled up like tubes under their arms. Her dad had some newspaper and matches, her mom the food. They all had to stand back while her dad lit the paper and got the small branches to catch. He said they had to let the fire breathe. 

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RULES OF THE LAKE

The following is a list of items to keep in mind when you are enjoying your cottage life. For those of you who rent your cottage this should be placed in a prominent position, as many renters are unfamiliar with some of unique conditions surrounding country property.

(1) WATER QUALITY

•

- (a) Never attempt to kill weeds in lake with any weed killing agent or chemical. This is a crime under the Fisheries Act, and carries a stiff fine.
- (b) Don't use soaps, shampoo or detergents in lake
- (c) Don't use fertilizers on lawns or gardens near the lake
- (e) Don't pour fuels near water or on the dock.
- (f) Don't idle boat notors when not necessary.

(2) BOATING SAFETY

- (a) Keep a bailer, oars, and lifejacket for each passenger in the boat at all times, and at night carry a flashlight (or use your runninglights).
- (b) Observe the 5MPH SPEED LIMIT under the bridges and through the channels.
- (c) When water skiing wear a life jacket, have a spotter in the boat, keep clear of swimmers, and stop your motor when taking skiers aboard.
- (d) Swimmers in open water must be accompanied by a boat.
- (e) Replace worn or leaky fuel lines.
- (f) It is illegal to consume any alcoholic beverages in a boat. Driving a motor boat while impaired is a criminal offence.

(3) COTTAGE SAFETY

- (A) Remove your valuables, guns and liquor from the cottage when closing for the season
- (b) Identify your valuables with an engraver (available from OPP in Minden) by placing a distinguishing mark in an inconspicuous place.
- (c) Keep a supply of candles and flashlights on hand in case of a blackout.
- (d) Keep a first aid kit on hand. Replace consumed items and be sure to check the expiry date.
- (e) In the winter don't park on ploughed roads.

(4) ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

- (a) When using the dumps make sure all the garbage goes entirely over the hill. Messy dumps have been closed by the Municipality in the past.
- (b) Put ONLY household garbage in the dumps. NO BRUSH, BOATS, FURNITURE, ETC. ONLY IN DESIGNATED AREAS. If you are doing renovations, use a dumpster and tell your contractor not to put wood, shingles etc. into the dump.
 - (c) Please keep our public beaches, lake, and roadsides clean. Put garbage in the cans provided.
 - (d) Don't peel bark off, or otherwise mutilate living trees.
 - (e) Remember to recycle bottles, cans and newspapers. Recycling bins available beside Rob Pooles at Fort Irwin Centre.

(5) SEPTIC TANKS

- (a) Septic tanks can handle all household wastes, including those from toilet, sink, showers, baths, washing machine and garbage-grinder. The amount of grease, household cleaners and disinfectants ordinarily encountered the household kitchen will not have any detrimental effect.
- (b) DON'T allow any paper towels, disposable diapers, sanitary napkins, tampons, cigarette and cigar butts, newspapers, wrapping papers, or rags to enter into tank. They are difficult to decompose and can clog the system.
- (c) Don't add any chemicals to the tank. No products are required to clean the tank or accelerate or improve it's action. All necesary bacteria are present in the tank and once the anaerobic process beings, nothing special needs to be added.
- (d) DON'T OVERLOAD YOUR TANK. If you are having a party, be sure you know the capacity of your tank.
- (e) Don't let any water from roof drains, foundation drains or any other source of runoff, enter your septic tank.
- (f) Inspect your tank annually to see if cleaning is required. If so, call a reputable pump-out service. Regular cleaning will save you money in the long run.

If everyone takes heed of the above rules our properties will keep there high value both in dollars and in beauty for many generations to come.

SAFE AND SOBER OPERATOR -

Many of us enjoy the use of recreational vehicles - boats, snowmobiles, dirt bikes, allterrain vehicles, personal watercraft, etc.. However, it is also important to understand that there are significant risks involved with the unsafe use of them. Each year, numerous serious injuries and fatalities occur as a result of the consumption of alcohol and/or other drugs while attempting to drive these various forms of recreational transport. 


